The College of Home Science Nirmala Niketan completed 67 years in the year 2022-2023. The first foundation stone was laid by Ms. Colette Galby in the year 1955 with the mission of providing quality education. College of Home Science Nirmala Niketan is a grant-in-aid Christian Minority Institution, affiliated to the University of Mumbai, managed by a Society, registered under the Society's Registration Act 1860 and Public Trust Act 1950 whose members belong to the Congregation of the Daughters of the Heart of Mary in India. This Society is managed by a Governing Body whose Ex-Officio Chairperson is the Provincial of the Daughters of the Heart of Mary in the Northern Province of India. The College holds the distinction of being the stand alone College in the University of Mumbai that offers education in the subject of Home Science.

Over the years, the College has widened its presence and excellence in terms of education and community outreach. With the aim at the total development of Indian Women, the College goal is development through education which is life-oriented, career-oriented and community-oriented. Values of respect, honesty, service to society, respect for all religions are woven into the fabric of our curriculum. Our motto "Kindle the Lamp of Light with thy Life" is put into practice by one and all.

The College has been instrumental in upgrading the physical infrastructure and curriculum to make learning more meaningful for the 21st century. It's a matter of pride and delight that the college has secured A+ Grade from the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) by securing a CGPA of 3.33.

The College was started with a certificate course in Home Science in 1955. The permanent affiliation of B.Sc. (Home Science) programme to the University of Mumbai was obtained in 1969 and two Master's programmes were introduced in 1972. Junior College started in 1976. Currently, the College has B.Sc. (Home Science) programmes in the following four specialisations:

- (a) Foods, Nutrition and Dietetics;
- (b) Human Development;
- (c) Textile and Fashion Technology; and
- (d) Community Resource Management

The M.Sc. (Home Science) and Ph.D. (Home Science) are offered in five specialisations: Branch IA: Foods, Nutrition and Dietetics (aided); Branch IB: Food Processing and Preservation (self-financed) and Branch IC: Sports Nutrition (self-financed); Branch II: Human Development (aided) and Branch III: Textile and Fashion Technology (aided). The College also offers multiple self financed diploma and certificate programmes for value addition. In 2012, the College introduced the semester-based credit and grading system under the directives of University of Mumbai and subsequently for higher levels on the basis of yearly progression. At the Junior College and B.Sc. levels, the College is only for women, whilst other programmes are open to both men and women. The College serves Christian students in particular and also other students, irrespective of their religion.

MESSAGE FROM THE I/C PRINCIPAL

Emerging into the Light: The Year 2022-2023

"I will love the light for it shows me the way, yet I will endure the darkness because it shows me the stars." – Og Mandino

This has been a year in which the COVID-19 pandemic could finally be put into the past, and uninterruptedly, we could have a year fully offline. We could never have imagined that we would live through a pandemic in our lifetime which would alter everything that until then we had taken for granted. The pandemic came with untold hardships that for some included grievous losses. At the same time, the circumstances of the pandemic had forced us to forge new sets of skills. Especially for those of us in education, examples include skills to do with online, blended and hybrid teaching-learning. The time away from the "madding crowd" (Thomas Hardy) may perhaps have centred us (or not).



Therefore, 2022-2023 has been a year in which healing from the pandemic-related distresses has remained an important focal point. It has been a year of renewal and a year of new hopes. We did not just come back to the same normal, we came back with pronounced needs for healing, and also with new strengths and skills. Moreover, students and staff who had become accustomed to largely online transactions have traversed newly available freedoms and made peace with the restrictions that accompany these freedoms. In other words, the freedoms and restrictions of online classes have had to be traded for the quite different (and welcome) liberties and restrictions of offline life.

Our theme this year has been *Fabric of Unity*, based on Azadi ka Amrit Mahotsav, 75 years of Independence. This theme has resonated throughout the year in the events that have been planned and conducted. However, this theme has a most special significance for us. The academic year, 2022-2023, is the first year of the College of Home Science Nirmala Niketan as an integrated unit after a long hiatus: The new certificate, diploma and advanced diploma programmes in Graphic Designing and Visual Communication (GDVC), Fashion Designing (FD), and Interior Designing (ID) for which we had obtained University approval the previous year, were launched this year. What a joy to once again be One Family, from Junior College to PhD. At the senior college level, the original four departments (Foods, Nutrition and Dietetics [FND], Human Development [HD], Textile and Fashion Technology [TFT], and Community Resource Management [CRM]), therefore, have been supplemented this year by three outstanding vocational/applied skills departments, namely, GDVC, FD, and ID, with all of these new programmes also being affiliated to the University of Mumbai. What a spectrum of new opportunities and new strengths! Of course, no doubt, this has also posed new challenges, which too have been negotiated with the spirit of cohesiveness energised by a shared vision.

The year 2022-2023 has included a series of *Firsts* for us:

- First year of the new Certificate and Diploma programmes in affiliated mode: Graphic Design and Visual Communication, Fashion Designing, and Interior Designing.
- First year of four add-on Diploma courses of the Departments of Human Development and Textile and Fashion Technology conducted in affiliated mode.

- We conducted an Aavishkar Workshop (a preliminary activity of the 17th Aavishkar Research Convention) on behalf of the University of Mumbai for the first time, in July 2022.
- For the first time, we hosted and organised the Zone 1 *Aavishkar* Research Convention in collaboration with the University of Mumbai, in December 2022. This 17th Aavishkar Research Convention covered colleges in the Mumbai Zone I (Colaba to Mahim, CSMT to Matunga, and CSMT to Wadala). As many as 179 research projects were presented, with presenting students numbering 431. Special appreciation to our ID Department which made the presentation infrastructure possible in the university budget provided.
- For the first time, we conducted the NEET examination on behalf of NTA, in May 2023.
- We participated in the University of Mumbai Youth Festival for the first time: 45 students participated in 22 different events of UoM's 55th Youth Festival.

Special achievements this year have included:

- Strategic planning was reignited. Dr. John Peter Anthony, from Loyola College Chennai (ranked 3rd best college in India by NIRF that year), conducted a three-day Faculty Development Workshop on Strategic Planning in June 2022.
- Junior College: Approval was obtained for the new subject of Child Development for the 11th standard in September 2022 (retrospective from 2020-2021) and for the 12th standard in February 2023 (retrospective from 2021-2022).
- We won the Zone 1 Championship at the 17th Aavishkar Research Convention organised by the Department of Students' Development, University of Mumbai.
- Our intercollegiate interdisciplinary undergraduate research competition, AARYA (Awareness and Action Research for Youth Awakening), for FY and SY undergraduate students this year was international! Dr. Anagha Vaidya Soocheta, Sr. Lecturer and Researcher, University of Mauritius, was our keynote speaker.
- A Fitness Boot Camp was conducted for 1000+ naval staff officers, sailors, and trainees at INS HAMLA, a naval base located at Marve, Malad West, Mumbai, by the students of the Postgraduate Diploma in Dietetics and Applied Nutrition in July 2022.
- Three new Professors! Dr. Bakshi, Dr. Karnad and Dr. Rege successfully completed their career advancement and became full Professors in March 2023.
- One more teacher with a PhD! We congratulate Dr. Sheetal Joshi!
- Congratulations to our faculty members, Prof. Vishaka Karnad and Ms. Vibha Hasija, for completing 25 years of service!

Other highlights of 2022-2023 include:

- In contrast to the delays experienced during the COVID-19 years, all programmes commenced in time this academic year and therefore examinations also were largely on schedule.
- UG and PG degree students of each department have presented research papers and posters at scientific competitions and conferences (other than the 17th Aavishkar Research Convention). Many prizes have been won by these students.
- Teachers continue to be recognised for their expertise by the university, regional, national and even international bodies.
- All Degree Departments have publications to their credit in 2022-2023.

- This academic year, we greatly increased the number of *intercollegiate* events and competitions. Some examples include: A product design Khadi Utsav Intercollegiate Competition was organised in October 2022. An Inter-collegiate Carol Singing Competition was organised in December 2022. AAGAZ, the annual cultural fest of the college, had a dedicated day in February 2023 for intercollegiate events with six competitions and a most spirited joyous participation from students of multiple colleges.
- World Mental Health Day was celebrated by two departments in particular. The Human Development Department organised three activities, with two of the three activities open to those outside the college: a Zentangle workshop, an interactive session with eminent psychiatrist Dr. Harish Shetty, and a mental health themed intercollegiate poster competition. The FND Department organized an event on Mindful Nourishment for children and youth with Autism and Down's Syndrome in collaboration with Verushka Foundation.
 - ional Consumer Day, World Breastfeeding Week, and Nutrition Month.
- We are keeping abreast of the changing times and latest trends in education! For example, a talk was arranged on the topic "Application of Artificial Intelligence in the field of Textile and Fashion Industry" for Textile and Fashion Technology students. Also, 40 PG students successfully completed a MOOC, with five students from the college topping their respective MOOC.
- We have formalised several new collaborations and MoUs.
- Extension activities continued to be our strength. FY and SY degree students had the opportunity to work through the NSS wing of the college. All Degree Department senior level students (TY/MSc) conducted extension activities at rural/tribal centres. The FND Department students participated in the Ashramshala project in rural/tribal areas. HD students also conducted extension activities at youth centres and old age homes in Mumbai. Moreover, HD students conducted online extension sessions as well, expanding their outreach to other parts of India (a skill learnt during the pandemic years). CRM students had a special project of Each One Teach One. Through the Department of Lifelong Learning and Extension (DLLE) of the University of Mumbai, TFT students worked with persons with Intellectual Disability, teaching them textile arts and crafts, while the CRM students engaged in community work aimed at women's empowerment.
- The Sports Committee noted the highest sports participation ever in the college in their *Kridangan* indoor and outdoor sports activities.
- The college has been a busy hub with activities to commemorate not just the Independence Day/Republic Day/Gandhi Jayanthi and festivals, but also wide-ranging days of significance such as the National Handloom Day, National Sports Day, Marathi Rajbhasha Divas, World Mental Health Day, International Yoga Day, Internat

JUNIOR COLLEGE

The Junior College reopened on 13th June 2022 with a new zeal and enthusiasm shown not only by the students but also the teachers. The curriculum at Junior College consists of a unique combination of arts and science subjects that includes the six subjects namely English, Hindi, Biology, Chemistry, Child Development and Psychology. Various programmes were conducted throughout the year to celebrate the days like Republic day, Independence Day, Marathi Bhasha Diwas and some important festivals.

Visits to other Schools for a Talk and Webinars on Careers in Home Science:

In order to reach out to the 10th std. students to inform them about the career opportunities in the domain of Home Science, all the teachers of the Junior College Department visited various schools in the Mumbai sub-urban region such as Our Lady of Dolours, Marine Lines; St. Joseph high School, Agripada; Colaba Municipal School, Baretto High School, Chira Bazar; Holy Horizon English School, Kalyan (E); J.B. The Department of Foods, Nutrition and Dietetics is a sprawling one with the aided and the self-financed sections. We run apart from the T.Y. BSc. in Foods, Nutrition and Dietetics, three post graduate Masters programmes – Foods, Nutrition and Dietetics, Food Processing and Preservation, Sports Nutrition and a P.G Diploma in Dietetics and Applied Nutrition and with a doctoral programme – with a total of 168 students. The value added course on Nutrition and Exercise for Fitness had an enrollment of 44 students.

The aided section worked with five full time teachers - Ms Vibha Hasija: HoD, Ms Jacqueline Colaco, Ms Fatima Kader, Dr Sheetal Joshi and Dr Minelly Rodrigues and Ms Shalmalee Potdar who was with us for a leave vacancy post. The Self-financed section had as faculty - Dr Yasmina Avari (Director of Self-Financed Courses), Dr Beryl Nithya (Coordinator of Self-Financed Courses), Dr Tasneem Ravat and Ms Simran Khandagale.

Departmental Activities:

- World Breastfeeding Week Activities: World Breastfeeding Week celebration, "Step up in Support of Breastfeeding" was organised in the form of a workshop on the 4th of September, 2022. This collaboration was with Nourish 1000 Days.
- Nutrition Month Activities: There were two major events organised to commemorate the National Nutrition Month

This event was followed by a Panel Discussion on the theme in collaboration with Indian Dietetic Association, Mumbai Chapter, in commemoration of the National Nutrition Month. This event culminated with the award ceremony of the Research awards — Utkarsh, Gyan Rachna and Nirmal Seva.

b. A Nutrition Workshop, Live Recipe Demonstration by Chef Nehal Karkera and Intercollegiate Recipe Competition in collaboration with California Walnuts Commission and IQAC, Department of Foods, Nutrition and Dietetics, Institution's Innovation Cell and the Women's Development Cell of the College was held on the 29th of September, 2022.

• Faculty Development Seminar:

Statistical Analysis of Data in Research, a successful SPSS training program for faculty development, enhancing participants' data analysis skills and fostering a research-oriented mindset was conducted by resource person Dr Neha Joshi on 10th & 11th October.

• Student Development Activities:

a. Bridge Course: The Bridge course that aimed to bridge the gap in students' understanding in the fields of Basic Nutrition and Food Science, as well as Basic Meal Planning was conducted for 44 students. This course coordinated by Dr Tasneem Rawat had a blend of online and offline sessions.

b. Value Added Courses:

The Value-Added Certificate Course 'Nutrition and Exercise for Fitness' affiliated to University of Mumbai was held in the blended mode and had 44 students completing this course.

c. Lecture Series:

- i. Introduction to Physiology: The Department organised an online lecture series of 15 hours on Physiology for the benefit of the students of T.Y. B.Sc. (Foods, Nutrition and Dietetics) and MSc II (Foods, Nutrition and Dietetics). It was coordinated by Ms Sheetal Joshi.
- ii. Research Methods and Statistics: A lecture series in Research Methods and Statistics was organized for students of T.Y. B.Sc. Home Science (Foods, Nutrition and Dietetics). It comprised 15 sessions and was coordinated by Dr Minelly Rodrigues.
- iii. A Continued Nutrition Education (CNE) was organised in collaboration with ASNFS (Association of Sports Nutritionists and Fitness Scientists) on 18th March 2023. The beneficiaries were the students of MSc Sports Nutrition from College of Home Science and of other colleges offering subjects of sports nutrition.
- iv. Training in Microbiological Techniques: A series of practical training sessions on microbiological techniques was organised for the students of M.Sc. II FPP by the college in order to demonstrate basic techniques required for microbiology experiments. This session helped the students gain basic information which helped them get direction to work on microbiology experiments for their dissertation.
- v. Training in Anthropometrical, Fitness and Body Composition Analysis of Navy Personnel: Ms Naaznin Husein, Nutrition Advisor -INS HAMLA (Joint Services Training Institute) approached the College to have a Fitness Booth Camp conducted for 1000 plus Naval Staff Officers, Sailors, and Trainees at INS HAMLA, a Naval Base located at Marve, Malad West, Mumbai. 35 students of the M.Sc. Sports Nutrition and PG Diploma in Dietetics and Applied Nutrition participated and was held from 18th July 2022 to 29th July 2022.
- vi. Project JEET: To enable students obtain the expertise to conduct an Action Research Project in the area of Football, Project JEET was initiated. This consisted of two parts The first to conduct a lecture series on Optimum Nutrition for Footballers. The syllabus was developed for this in collaboration with our Alumna Ms Romaisa Khan. Students were evaluated on a continuous basis and at the end of the lecture series. For the second part of the project, 15 of the best performing students were selected to conduct an Action Research Group Project for their thesis. This was conducted in collaboration with Kenkre Football Academy. The students were placed in charge of the players and they conducted assessments and educational programmes.

- vii. Nutrikhoj 2022-2023: A research proposal competition 'Nutrikhoj', coordinated by Dr Minelly Rodrigues, was conducted by the Department of Foods, Nutrition and Dietetics for students of T.Y. B.Sc.
- viii. Experiential learning–Study Tour: The T.Y. B.Sc. and M.Sc. 2 FND students went to Hyderabad for the study tour in the last week of December 2022 and the students of M.Sc.1 FND, M.Sc.1 and 2 of FPP and SN as well as the PG Diploma students were taken to various industries in Pune for an experiential experience from 13th to 15th of March 2022.
- xi. Rural Camps were organised to learn about serving the community and to understand the real life scenarios in the underprivileged and rural communities. T.Y.B.Sc.'s visited Nirmala Niketan Institute run community center in Vaijapur and the post graduate students visited various ashramshalas in the district of Pen in Maharashtra.

Collaborative Events:

- i. Collaboration with recipients of the Davis Peace Project from the University of Reed UK: The Department collaborated with Ms Anoushka Goenka and Mr Eshan Tatthe from Reed University, Portland, USA. The students of T.Y. B.Sc. FND were involved with this project. They formulated low cost, nutrient rich recipes using locally available ingredients.
- ii. Collaboration with Indian Institute of Technology Bombay: 20 students of the P.G. Diploma in Dietetics and Applied Nutrition were involved in a collaborative special project with the Indian Institute of Technology Bombay. This project which studied the Glycaemic Index of Jaggery involved the students in data collection for the project and they received certificates for the work completed.
- iii. Paushticon Conference (Theme- Ensuring Sustainability in Food and Nutrition) was organised by the Nutrition Society of India (NSI), Mumbai Chapter in collaboration with College of Home Science, Nirmala Niketan, Mumbai MGM, School of Biomedical Sciences, MGMIHS, Navi Mumbai Lifeness Science Institute, Mumbai on the 27th and 28th January, 2023. The department staff was actively involved in the organisation of this e-conference. This was attended by MSc students. Students also presented their research work in the poster category.
- iv. TANTRA 2.0 Cortisol Stories: Cortisol Stories- Multipronged Stress Reduction from Research to Application. A half day Seminar and a workshop on Guided Garbha was held in collaboration with IAPEN Mumbai Chapter on March 25th, 2023. This well received event discussed various aspects of the impact of high cortisol on health and multi-pronged strategies to manage them. The Guided Garbha workshop was engaging and enjoyable with many learning touch points.
- v. Verushka Foundation: On the occasion of World Mental Health day to create nutritional awareness our college organised an event on Mindful Nourishment for children, adolescents and youth with Autism and Down syndrome in collaboration with Verushka Foundation on October 10th 2022. This group was enrolled with Verushka Foundation to learn culinary skills. The main goal was to educate them how to prepare nutritionally adequate foods. The demonstrated recipes were converted into a flipbook:

Finally, we were out of the throes of the COVID-19 pandemic, and the new academic year 2022-2023 started out and remained fully offline through the year. What a relief! Simultaneously, what massive readjustments for students who had been largely online for two years in a row and whose experience of college life had been mostly restricted to Microsoft Teams or Zoom. Coming to college every day, sitting in a classroom, engaging with multiple assignments, all seemed a very different world, especially to our T.Y. B.Sc. students. We had to reconstruct the normal and all department teachers worked towards this. As the Department Head, I myself had so many sessions to bolster the spirits of students and to negotiate together how to best manage the college work-scape. Overall, the students worked through their worries and stress, cherished the joys of learning in college, and across the two terms pitched in their best, supported by department teachers and the college counsellor. At the FY/SY levels, our young(er) staff, Ms Khyati Sampat, Ms Brenda Fernando, and Ms Vanitha D'Souza played a much-needed supportive role as mentors of young students transitioning into a fully offline mode in education.

Off-campus curricular activities included T.Y. HD students' preschool placement at Children's Academy Malad (under the guidance of Ms Rhonda Divecha) and Children's Academy Kandivili (under the guidance of Ms Payal Maheshwari) for one day a week for the first term, along with M.Sc. 2 student supervisors. M.Sc. 2 students completed internships in agencies/organisations such as the Somaiya School, Therapeutic Dwelling, Institute of Exceptional Children, SpEd@home - Every child enabled, LogIqids (an educational and learning app for children), and Muktangan Schools, under the mentorship of Dr Bakshi. Dr Rege placed MSc1 students for their Early Childhood Education Practicum in St. John Universal School and the Somaiya School. Under Dr Rege's guidance, M.Sc. 1 students in the second term visited and/or completed brief internships in numerous HD-related agencies and organisations (e.g., Dignity Foundation, Ashadaan, Sakhya Women's Guidance Cell, YUVA, Kripa Foundation, Majlis Manch, Bombay Foundation of Deaf Women, and Adhata Trust).

Student extension and outreach activities are integral to the department and college vision and therefore are embedded in the curriculum as well as augmented by co-curricular activities. In the second term, T.Y. and M.Sc. 2 HD students conduced multiple extension activities at the Vidhyadeep Community Centre, Bharuch, Gujarat, and also with the students of the Nirmala Niketan Junior College of Home Science, under the guidance of Ms Rhonda Divecha and Ms Khyati Sampat. These included workshops with adolescent girls on enhancing self-esteem and assertiveness, building and maintaining friendships, communication skills, personal etiquette, and personal hygiene and cleanliness. Activity sessions were conducted for the elderly in old age homes in Mumbai with the goal of fostering socioemotional and cognitive development; other sessions conducted in old age homes addressed conflict between family and friends, the use of positive affirmations, and maintaining self-esteem and self-faith. Workshops were conducted with nursing programme students on the importance of teamwork and financial literacy through the Yuva Parivartan Centre in Mumbai. Educational and recreational activities were also conducted at Kripa Foundation, Bandra, and at Umang Special School, Vasai.

Student and staff development activities organised by the department included three activities to celebrate the World Mental Health Day on 10th October 2023. Ms Payal Maheshwari took the leadership to organise a Zentangle workshop for the department students and staff, conducted by our alumna Ms Zainab Bhinderwala. In the afternoon, Ms Maheshwari organised a very insightful session (open to outsiders as well) on "Mental Health and Well-being", with an eminent speaker, psychiatrist Dr Harish Shetty. Four colleges also participated in the intercollegiate poster competition on mental health and well-being, which was our third activity to celebrate the World Mental Health Day.

Dr Bakshi organised an inspirational interactive session in January 2023 for all department students with our illustrious alumna, Dr Toral Sanghvi, who is the Vice President of Community Services at The Village, an outstanding non-profit organisation in USA. The Funtastic Fest (HD Mela), organised by Ms Rhonda Divecha and department staff and students in February 2023, was a fantastic success with NNCHSC students and outsiders. Our Chief Guest, Prof. Dr Vini Sebastian, the young children who visited, the college youth participants, the adult participants, all wholeheartedly partook of the educational, psychospiritual, fun and games, craft, photobooth, and eatery stalls that decked the hall, the stage, and the backyard of the college. Ms Rhonda Divecha organized a Sensitivity Building Workshop in March 2023 for department T.Y. students called "ANTARCHAKSHU: THE INNER EYE", conducted by Dr Sam Taraporevala and Prof. Krishna Warrier from the St. Xavier's Resource Centre for the Visually Challenged. M.Sc. 2 students, under the guidance of Dr Bakshi, organised several Alternative Therapies Workshops, on topics such as Sujok Therapy and Reflexology, Acupressure and Chakra Healing, Reiki Healing, Arts Based Therapy, Music Therapy and Hypnosis, and got an opportunity to interact with practitioners from these fields.

Department T.Y. and M.Sc. students (and accompanying staff members) had very many opportunities for extra-mural learning through their study tour in Gujarat in March 2023. Ms Payal and Dr Rege were the teachers in charge of the study tour, and along with the students and Ecstasy Tours had planned and executed a multi-city educational tour with visits to internationally and nationally reputed organisations such as: Gijubhai Badheka's the Dakshinamurti Balmandir and PNR Society for Relief and Rehabilitation of the Disabled in Bhavnagar; Amul Dairy in Anand; the Department of Human Development and Family Studies, Faculty of Family and Community Sciences, Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda in Vadodara; and Sri Aurobindo Society's Auronivas, Lakshya Trust, and Balbhavan Society also in Vadodara.

Excellence in Socially Relevant Research is an ongoing best practice of the department (and of, course the college too). Department teachers scaffold student research projects right from S.Y. B.Sc. through PhD levels. At the S.Y. B.Sc. level, Ms Sampat mentored a group of students on the research topic "Level of Awareness about Human Papillomavirus (HPV) and HPV Vaccine among Indians" and Ms Fernando guided a project entitled "Legal Awareness about Senior Citizens' Rights among the Elderly and their Significant Others". At the T.Y. HD level, Dr Bakshi's students completed research projects on topics such as "Use of Assistive Technologies by People with Disabilities: A Multi-informant Study" (student leaders: Ms Kinjal Shah & Ms Juveria Khan), and "Pandemic and Post Pandemic Challenges and Opportunities in the Informal Work Sector" (student leader: Ms Shumaila Khan). Dr Rege guided T.Y. HD students who completed research projects on topics such as "Knowledge and Awareness regarding Andropause in Males (40-60 years) among the Selected Professions (Bank employees, Teachers, Police)" (student leader: Ms Samruddhi Suralka), and "Menstrual Hygiene Management: Recommendations by Gynaecologists, Special Educators and Practices Implemented by Mothers of Trainable Mentally Challenged Girls (13 - 19 years)" (student leader: Ms Janvi Chheda). M.Sc. 1 student topics included "Remote, Office or Hybrid? Employees' Post-Pandemic Work Experiences and Preferences" (student leader: Ms Batul Ghadiali; guide: Dr Bakshi), "Opportunities in Higher Education and Employment for People with Special Needs" (student leader: Ms Misbah Khan; guide: Ms Maheshwari), and "Awareness and Perception of Bank Employees regarding Sexual Harassment at Workplace" (student leader: Ms Jerusha Cabral; guide: Dr Rege). M.Sc. 2 dissertation topics covered areas such as "Indian Students Studying Abroad: Benefits, Challenges, Coping, and Wellbeing" (student: Ms Riya Author; guide: Dr Bakshi); "Parental Monitoring of their Children's (7-to-12 Years of Age) Usage of Hand-held Devices" (student: Ms Shaheen Khan; guide: Ms Divecha); "Relationship between Levels of Emotional Intelligence, Stress and Job Satisfaction among Nurses Working in Private Hospitals in Mumbai" (student: Ms Sherin Samuel; guide: Ms Maheshwari); and "Couples' Practice of Gratitude and Relationship to Wellbeing" (student: Ms Jinagna Gondolia; guide: Ms Sampat).

Department teachers supported and partnered students in making scientific paper and poster presentations of their research projects in various competitions. Eighteen such presentations were made at an online international level in India. Thus, at a hybrid international conference organised by Aligarh Muslim University on "Mental Health and Covid-19: Challenges and Future Prospects" in November 2022, examples of T.Y. HD students' online research presentations included "Back to School after the Pandemic: School Children's Perspective of What they Like Most and Like Least about Being Back in School" (student leader: Ms Mansi Palande; guide: Dr Bakshi), and "Needs and Expectations of Primary Caregivers Working with Children with Cancer" (student leader: Ms Rashida Ghadiyali, guide Dr Rege). Five research presentations were made by Dr Rege's students at the national level this year. For example, a T.Y. HD research group (student leader: Ms Alefiya Ratlamwala) presented a poster on "Breaking the Vicious Cycle of Domestic Violence against Women: Perception of Selected Professionals (Doctors, Advocates, Police, Counsellors & Married Women)" at the SRIJNA National Level Poster Presentation 2023 organised by Guru Nanak Khalsa College of Arts, Science & Commerce, Mumbai, to commemorate National Science Day. As many as 23 presentations were made by HD students across UG, PG and PPG levels for the 17th Aavishkar Research Convention organised by the Department of Students' Development, University of Mumbai.

HD students were appreciated for their scientific presentations by external jury members at various forums and we are proud to have received multiple awards and mentions. Ms Jinagna Gondolia and team's (M.Sc. 2 students; guide: Dr Bakshi) presentation on "Use of Online Counselling during the Covid-19 Pandemic: Perspectives of Counsellors" was judged to be the best paper in Technical Session 8 of the hybrid international conference on "Mental Health and Covid-19: Challenges and Future Prospects", organised by Aligarh Muslim University in November 2022. Likewise, Ms Jennifer James's presentation (M.Sc. 1 student; guide: Dr Rege) on "Perimenopausal Stage: Perception of Husbands and Wives" was judged as the best paper at the hybrid international conference on "Role of Counselling in Dealing with Mental Health Issues", organised by Aligarh Muslim University in September 2022. Ms Jennifer James (guide: Dr Rege) also got the third prize at the SRIJNA National Level Poster Presentation Competition 2023 organised by Guru Nanak Khalsa College of Arts, Science and Commerce, Mumbai in February 2023, for her poster entitled, "Recommendations to Support the Wife During Perimenopause: A Husband's Guide"; and Ms Rashida Ghadiyali (T.Y. B.Sc. student; guide: Dr Rege) got the Consolation Prize at the same competition for her poster on "Exploring the Challenges and Support Needs of Primary Caregivers Caring for Children (Birth to 12 Years) with Cancer". S.Y. B.Sc. students guided by Ms Fernando got a third prize for their research on "Legal Awareness about Senior Citizens' Rights among the Elderly and their Significant Others" presented at AARYA International Interdisciplinary Undergraduate Research Competition organized by the College of Home Science Nirmala Niketan on 28th February 2023.

Dr Bakshi, Dr Rege, and Ms Brenda Fernando have publications to their credit. Dr Bakshi and Ms Fernando published a research paper on the pivotal roles of geography and gender in the careers of young adults in villages. Dr Rege published a research paper on online education and another on caregiving for the elderly during the COVID-19 pandemic with ex-students, Ms Binal Dedhiya and Ms Nidhi Khimavat.

This academic year, we launched the One Year Diploma Course in Indian Sign Language, for which we had received approval and affiliation from the University of Mumbai in the previous academic year. Ms Rhonda Divecha coordinated the ISL value-added course, and 28 students enrolled and completed this diploma course.

Our teachers are dedicated lifelong learners. All of us participated in the three-day faculty development programme in the college on strategic planning in late June 2022, conducted by Dr John Peter Anthony from Loyola College (ranked the third best college in India by NIRF), Chennai. Dr Rege completed a short-term course in designing and developing online courses, and Ms Khyati Sampat completed an interdisciplinary online refresher course in life sciences. Ms Payal Maheshwari attended several international and national online seminars and workshops on disability such as "Autism from the Inside", "Peer Support, Disability, and Mental Health", and "Disability and Hindi Cinema". Our department teachers are much sought-after resource persons and are happy to share their knowledge and skills with varied target groups outside the college as well. Examples include the following: Dr Bakshi was the keynote speaker for a national seminar on "Integrative Therapy, Innovations & Best Practices in Counselling" organised by the Goa College of Home Science (Goa University) and the Government of Goa, Directorate of Higher Education, in March 2023. Dr Rege conducted a workshop on "Assessment in Foundational Years", organised by the Early Childhood Association along with the Indian Principals Network for pre-primary school teachers pan India, in January 2023. Ms Rhonda Divecha conducted a workshop in May 2023 on "Self Esteem Assessment & Rational Emotive Behaviour Therapy (REBT)" for the brothers of the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament (SSS), as part of their psychospiritual integration training. Ms Fernando was invited as a resource person by Dr B.M.N. College of Home Science to talk on "Perspectives for Early Childhood Care and Education" in August 2022.

Dr Anuradha J. Bakshi and Dr Kamini P. Rege concluded their Stage 4 to Stage 5 career advancement and were promoted to full Professors on 10th March 2023. This was a landmark achievement of the department. Dr Rege's student, Ms Alannah Fernandes, successfully defended her doctoral thesis and completed her PhD in July 2022. Department teachers are chairpersons and members of Boards of Studies. Thus, for example, Prof. Bakshi is the Chairperson, Board of Studies for Human Development and Family Studies, Faculty of Family and Community Sciences, Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda, Gujarat; and, Ms Sampat is Member, Board of Studies at Department of Human Development, SVT College of Home Science (Autonomous), SNDT Women's University, Juhu. Department teachers are editors and reviewers for international, indexed scientific journals. For example, Prof. Bakshi is an Advisory Board Member of the International Journal for Educational and Vocational Guidance, published by Springer; Ms Sampat is a reviewer for the British Journal of Guidance and Counselling. Continuing with international recognition, it is important to note that Ms Fernando is the Chair of Administration, Global Student Psychology Committee, APA, Division 52. Department teachers are members of academic and professional organisations. Again, for example, Dr Rege is the Founder Member and Joint Secretary National Committee - India ECA (Early Childhood Association) and APER (Association for Primary Education and Research). Ms Maheshwari is a member of various prestigious academic organisations such as the International Association of Special Education and the Australasian Human Development Association.

We are enormously thankful for the 2022-2023 academic year and are glad to have bid farewell to the COVID-19 pandemic, which in the previous two academic years had grown to dystopian proportions. We are grateful to every person and group that partnered and participated with us this year and wish them well. In 2023-2024, we have NEP-2020 curricular plans in particular, as also our continuing goals of student and staff well-being and development, and service and contribution. DEPARTMENT OF TEXTILE AND FASHION TECHNOLOGY

The Department is very proactive and stays updated with the latest trends. the students in their academic pursuits. All the courses offered by the department aim at developing professional skills such as leadership, problem-solving and team dynamics as well as essential value-added skills. The department encourages independent study and under-graduate research projects in current advances in relevant fields. It offers one month internship programme where students gain valuable experience and accomplishments that enhance their résumés creating an added advantage.

The department undertakes outreach programmes, consultancy, organises conferences, seminars, workshops and other training activities in the pertinent fields. It works in close collaboration with various industries, consumer organisations, academic and research institutions.

Department offers Certificate course in Workstation Design and Applied Ergonomics for which 19 T.Y.CRM students got enrolled. The department organised workshops for Junior College 12th standard students on 'Orientation to Careers in Community Resource Management' in online mode.



The Department began the academic year with parents' orientation programme on 20th June 2022. 43 parents attended the orientation programme with lots of queries. It was an interactive session.












RURAL CAMP TO VAIJAPUR – A GREAT LEARNING EXPERIENCE








The students of T.Y. B.Sc. had gone for a rural visit to Vaijapur, Aurangabad from 20th to 22nd February 2023. Total 35 students were accompanied by two teachers: Dr Sheetal Joshi and Ms Fizza Shaikh. The nuns and children living in the boarding school welcomed us with warm smiles. Few of us played games with them and some of us learned how to converse in Marathi. Dinner was prepared by the girls for us. It was a hearty meal. The next day began with a bonfire and yoga guided by Ms Apeksha Pawar. We had our breakfast and left for villages to provide nutrition education. Three teams of 10-12 students were made and each team went to one village and interacted with the students and women of the village. The three villages were Loni, Khandala and Janefhal. We performed a street play for the students on the topic 'Healthy and Unhealthy Foods and the Importance of Breast-Feeding for Women'. Each team did a recipe demonstration to the women with the view of inculcating the practice of eating sprouted pulses and vegetables among them. We also took the MUAC measurements of more than 150 students in the villages. The students then showcased their different talents of singing, dance acting, etc. The women welcomed us in the traditional way with flowers and vermillion powder. It was a different experience for us to see how each one of the women and students had a desire to learn something new. Few of them had left their work on the farms and had come to listen to what we had to offer. We then went to a local villager's house for lunch where they welcomed us

with flowers, the traditional vermillion powder. They were very happy to see that we were enjoying the meal prepared by them. We interacted with a few ladies and they informed us that the Nirmala Niketan Institute had been helping them with their daily livelihood. Many of them had wheat farms, and chicken and cows as their livestock. Many of them had adopted the method of kitchen gardening where they grew vegetables in their own gardens. After the visit to villages, we then proceeded to a rain harvesting spot. Marathwada is known as a drought prone area but these villagers together had adopted the method of rain water harvesting and there were crops grown in that area. It was surprising to see how there was a small lake filled with water and irrigation was also taking place in a drought prone area. We then went to our dormitory and rested well. We were given an orientation by Sr. Nancy who explained about what the institution does and caters to the young children in the village. She also explained the work that they do in other villages and how they have created various schemes for the betterment of men, women, youth and children. None of us felt like an outsider there. And that's what each of us has taken back from this visit: 'To be grateful and appreciate the little things we have in life.' It was a beautiful experience for all of us which would be cherished as this was the last trip where we would all be together. We wish we could have a few more days to spend time in the villages and learn lot more about them. We left the next day morning and reached our homes with happy memories and a lot of learning!

MY EXPERIENCE AT A RURAL CAMP!



Recently, I got an opportunity to go for a rural camp at Pen, Maharashtra at Shaskiya Madhyamik Ashram Shala, Varvane. It was a great experience in terms of teaching young minds (from 1st to 8th std.) about various topics such as personal hygiene, menstrual hygiene, microgreen plantation, healthy recipes made from microgreens, balanced diet, environment cleanliness, etc. Various activities were performed for their easy learning such as action games, drawings, memory games, posters, etc.

Upon entering the class, they were greeted with namaste and eyes full of excitement. These children understood only the Marathi language and I was terrible at speaking Marathi. Eventually they in a way understood what I wanted to convey. Indeed, love has no language! The activities played brought a smile to their faces which made my day. Being away from their parents and staying at a hostel yet being cheerful and thankful for whatever bare minimum they have is what is instilled in each one of them. These kids were full of energy to learn new things. They were shy initially but after opening up, the noise they made, and the fun they had reminded me of my childhood. On the second day, when we reached school, all the children were so thrilled to see us back and so was I. They were shouting and waving back at us. I was very excited too, to teach them, it triggered my fun teacher side. After visiting their kitchen and dining hall, I got to know about their simple food habits. They got their plates and after eating even washed them. I never felt that they ever complained about where they came from or about their situation. They were happy about it.

That visit was a fruitful experience wherein I understood that I loved being around the children, teaching them, and learning from them. It also taught me about how a system works at the rural level and the actions taken for their overall development.

In return these kids taught me unknowingly the valuable life lessons to be thankful, selfless, humble and to cherish the little things we have and sharing the happiness with others.

Vidhyadeep Community College: Unity amongst the Community

After the new normal, who would have thought that we could get equally great opportunities to learn on the field as we used to get before the pandemic!

The College of Home Science Nirmala Niketan, Department of Human Development organized a two-day extension trip to Vidhyadeep Community College, Bharuch. The extension trip was part of our curriculum where department staff, Ms Rhonda Divecha and Ms Khyati Sampat took the lead to plan, organise, and execute the trip with 42 T.Y. B.Sc. and 9 M.Sc. I and 8 M.Sc. II students.

To make the process smoother both our teachers had divided T.Y. B.Sc. students into groups and each of these groups were allotted under the M.Sc. II HD students. There were four groups, each group included two M.Sc.-II students and around 12 T.Y. B.Sc. students. M.Sc.II students had to supervise, facilitate the T.Y. Students of Vidhyadeep College were also divided in batches so that it was easier for each group to have the interactive learning experience of each other's groups.

The objective of the 'Communication skills and Personal Etiquette' workshop was to make the students understand the basics of communication and the various skills required for communication. And also to make students understand the basic personal etiquettes through activity, its importance in different settings and its application in different situations.

To help students understand about self-esteem and assertive behaviour was the main objective of the 'Enhancing Self-esteem and Assertiveness skills' workshop. So this workshop helped them to differentiate between assertive aggressive and non-assertive behaviour, levels of assertiveness and how they can be practiced through situations. This workshop also helped in making them aware about how to increase self-esteem and to identify what are the sources to increase self-esteem.

The 'Personal Hygiene and Cleanliness' workshop's aim was to introduce the basic words related to menstrual hygiene, tips / strategies that could be helpful during periods, importance of cleanliness exercising, and the process to maintain cleanliness.

The workshop on 'Building and Maintaining friendship' focused to help students know the importance of friendship, skills that are required to build and maintain the friendship over a period of time such as trust during challenging times, knowing likes and dislikes of friends, supporting

and helping each other, and how to resolve conflicts in an effective way between friends.

The M.Sc.I's workshop on 'Creative Teaching Aids strategies for ECCE', had the objective to teach them about different cost-effective teaching aids like puppets, diorama, flash cards, object talk, picture talk, concept cards in various concepts like alphabets, stories, etc.

The workshop on 'Basic Video Making and Editing Strategies' was done to clarify the basics of video making and editing using different apps and software's across devices. They used different interfaces of apps/software's across devices such as: MS PowerPoint (Windows - PC), Inshot (mobile phone), and VN Video Maker (mobile phone). For each batch, M.Sc I introduced themselves and built rapport before proceeding with the sessions, gauging their prior knowledge with regard to video making and editing. They then, one by one, showed them a sample video made using one of the apps and then a demonstration as to how it was made. At the end, as they were well versed with MS PowerPoint, asked them to create a video out of their previously made PPTs. It was an interactive and fun session, as deemed from the responses throughout all the sessions and across batches.

All of these workshops were conducted with various batches on both of the days i.e. 2nd March, 2023 (Noon till Evening) and on 3rd March 2023 (Morning till Evening). After each session there was a feedback session so that we improved ourselves and our workshop each time that we executed it.

On the evening of 2nd March, 2023 we were informed that we will have a Cultural Exchange Programme the next day, so from the late afternoon of 3rd March 2023 all of us, including the students of Vidhyadeep college were working on our beautiful event which was an end to our 2-

day journey, the Cultural Exchange Programme. The programme was totally student- led, in which both the College's students taught each other about their respective cultures via dance, song, and role play. The students of Vidhyadeep college taught Nirmala Niketan's students their cultural dance i.e. Adivasi dance while students of Nirmala Niketan taught Vidhyadeep college girls dance of different cultures, funny role plays on how some Hindi songs were made, etc. This programme was the best way to end our extension trip. The programme was culturally enriched, we learned so much about each other's culture whilst having fun, it also helped us connect with them, understand each other's values and culture.

On the morning of 4th March, 2023 all of us were content and with all these learning experience we had to leave for our journey back to Mumbai but before doing so we showed our gratitude to the sisters via Thank You card in which students expressed their feedback as to how grateful each one us were to have been accommodated in such a pleasant, calm environment of Vidhyadeep college with all the necessary requirements.

The Department of Human Development had made it a point to emphasize that what we learn is what we apply in reality, to grow in humanity, respect each other's belief, empower, understand each other and flourish lives.

The Art of Giving

The practical for Sustainable Community Work (Semester V) and Sustainable Social Entrepreneurship (Semester VI) offered to the T.Y. B.Sc. students of the specialization of Textile and Fashion Technology is always a very rewarding and satisfying experience, as unlike in other subjects, where the students learn, here the students are the facilitators. They impart knowledge and skill sets to the underprivileged, in order to make them self-reliant, thus doing their bit in returning their privileges to the society.

The academic year however was very special as the target group at the Bhakar Foundation, an NGO situated at Bhagat Singh Colony 1 and 2, Goregaon West, catering to underprivileged girls and women between the ages of 16 - 60 years of age was an extremely enthusiastic group, and responded very well to the training that was imparted to them.

A total of eight sessions were held in Semester V starting from 13th August to 15th October 2022. The products taught focused on sustainability, thus utility products like tea coasters, attractive fabric jewelry, made out of post-consumer fabric waste were taught.









Skills were also imparted keeping in mind the need of the market, and so 'torans' and latkans' made from waste yarn and pre-used bangles were taught just before the Ganpati festival, and lanterns and fabric pouches made from 'Khunn' fabric sourced from local temples was taught just before Diwali.

In order to improve market acceptability of products, the target group was also imparted training in surface enrichment techniques like stencil printing and embroidery.

Recognizing that skill building alone will not suffice to gain a place in the market, the knowledge of sourcing, costing, branding, packaging and marketing in addition to skill development was imparted during Semester VI.

A total of ten sessions were held between 5th January and 8th April 2023. This semester, the NGO had purchased sewing machines due to the enthusiasm and interest shown by the target group, so, many different products that needed advanced sewing skills like bottle carriers, scissor holders, pouches and bags were taught to the beneficiaries. Crochet and macramé skills which are artisanal methods of fabric manufacture were also imparted and hair scrunchies, bracelets and wall hangings were made using these techniques. Each product taught during the earlier semester and during the ongoing semester was evaluated in terms of sourcing, costing, branding and packaging. Different marketing techniques, especially the use of social media was taught to the target group through simple presentation, videos and talks that were suited to their level of literacy.

Overall, the experience gained by the students was extremely enriching as they had gained life skills through their interaction with beneficiaries who hailed from a multitude of backgrounds. The students gave whole heartedly, and received many fold through the experience.

We had loads and loads of fun. One of our favourite memories include tribal Warli dance with Kharasgaon girls. It was an amazing thing! VALUE ADDED COURSE IN NUTRITION EXERCISE AND FITNESS

The Value-Added Certificate Course in 'Nutrition Exercise and Fitness' was conducted by the Department of Foods, Nutrition and Dietetics. This is one of a kind courses for anyone who would like to hone their knowledge and skills in the field of nutrition for fitness.

This course is a pinnacle of research and evidence – based curriculum as well as applied knowledge. The integration of value-added courses focuses on leveraging the aptitude and pioneering capabilities of the budding professionals to meet the needs of the contemporary dynamic business environment thus making the student more confident in the industry. Students not only gained scientific knowledge but also developed the requisite skills in the nutrition and fitness industry.

The value-added programmes supplement student's knowledge and augments their preparedness to meet the challenges of professional life. These programmes enable the students to acquire a holistic perspective and thus have better understanding of the present day industry challenges and also facilitate the students to gain and develop innovative and creative skills through a wide array of course offerings.

Dr R. Beryl Nithya coordinated the course for the year 2022-23. The Value-Added Course lectures were scheduled along with their graduation lectures. This year the course was conducted in the hybrid mode; the practical sessions were held offline and the theory sessions were held online. Expert faculty in the field offered a multimodal learning experience to the students. The faculty team had Ms Kraney Shah, Ms Niti Dhulla, Ms Farida Gohil, Mr. Nikhil Palani and Mr. Tejas Rajaputhran on it.

The course was conducted from February 2023 – June 2023, forty-four students enrolled for the course. The subjects included in the course were two theory papers, viz
1. Exercise and Holistic Health, 2. Nutrition for fitness and one Practical paper – Assessment of Fitness.

A project was assigned to the students, they had to work in groups. They had to select one type of supplements essential for fitness. They had to conduct a literature review on the selected supplements. Furthermore, they had to explain the mechanism of action of the supplements, effectiveness, usage, dosage and timings of intake.

The project also required them to conduct an online survey and enlist various brands of the supplements their price, types and available forms in the market. Based on the report submitted they had also made a presentation on the project. The awards for the best project and highest marks toppers 1 and 2, course completion certificates, and mark sheets were announced and distributed on the Valedictory day.

ADD-ON CERTIFICATE COURSE IN VISUAL MERCHANDISING

This Add-on Course is being conducted by the Department of Textile and Fashion Technology and was coordinated by Dr Pratima Goyal and Dr Ritu Madhan in the academic year 2022–23. The students submitted an assignment for every subject. The final examinations were held from 3rd April to 6th April 2023. All the students completed the course successfully.

ONE YEAR ADD-ON DIPLOMA COURSE IN CAD-CAM AND COMPUTER TECHNOLOGIES IN THE APPAREL INDUSTRY

This course is recognized by the University of Mumbai and is conducted by the Department of Textile and Fashion Technology. It was coordinated by Dr Pratima Goyal and Ms Vrinda Udiaver.

Thirty seven T.Y. B.Sc. students from Textile and Fashion Technology (TFT) and one M.Sc. I TFT student (as a bridge course) enrolled for the course (Total of 38 students). It is a mandatory requirement for the Bachelor's degree programme. Theory and practicals were taught by Mr Sameer Panchamatia and supervised by Dr Pratima Goyal and Ms Vrinda Udiaver.

The Semester I classes commenced from 21st September 2022 and ended on 18th January 2023. Semester I Examination was held on 30th January, 2023. Semester II classes were conducted from 8th February, 2023 to 5th April, 2023.

Thorough training on using CorelDraw Version 15 and Richpeace Designing and Pattern Making Software was imparted during the sessions. Tools of CorelDraw were used to create for making different shapes of necklines, print repeats, embroidery motifs, croquis rendering, garment rendering pattern creation and designing stationery (related to branding). Richpeace Software was used for drafting of patterns and creation of styles using different types of collars, sleeves, pleats, etc. Layout efficiency, optimised fabric utilization and introduction to Photoshop were well covered in the classes. Students worked on different assignments based on aforementioned topics.

We learnt about repeats and use of various tools, formatting business cards, envelops, look-book development for purposes of branding, complete drafting of garments. Overall it was very good with fun-learning of essential industry based skills."

ADD-ON ONLINE AND OFFLINE DIPLOMA COURSE IN CAD, CAM AND COMPUTER TECHNOLOGIES IN THE TEXTILE AND APPAREL INDUSTRY - INTERMEDIATE

This course is a mandatory requirement for the Master's degree programme in Textile and Fashion Technology. Seven students of M.Sc. I Branch III, Textile and Fashion Technology, enrolled for the programme.

Semester I commenced on 14th September 2022 to 28th January 2023. Semester II commenced on 11th February 2023 to 1st April 2023.

Skills on using Photoshop tools including vector/raster, creating repeats, croquis rendering, garment rendering, colour variation, layouts, website design and animation using Adobe Photoshop and Corel Draw, Video editing, transitions, voice over multi-track editing, etc. were well covered in the class and students worked on assignments related to the mentioned topics.

ADD-ON ONLINE AND OFFLINE DIPLOMA COURSE IN CAD, CAM AND COMPUTER TECHNOLOGIES IN THE TEXTILE AND APPAREL INDUSTRY- ADVANCED

This course is a mandatory requirement for the fulfilment of the Master's degree programme in Textile and Fashion Technology. Nine M.Sc. II TFT students enrolled for this programme.

Semester I commenced on 14th September 2022 to 28th January 2023. Semester II commenced on 9th February 2023 to 8th April 2023. Training on using Adobe Photoshop tools for 3D Image creating, meta data panel, introduction to 3D and digital platform, Colour software, Online software for colours, Online Advertising and Marketing, Web page coding, Website and portfolio designing, Design user interface, image optimization, creating a domain and publishing a website were well-covered and assignments were given based on these skills taught. This soft-skill based training programme was intensive including both theory and practical that were effectively taught by Mr Sameer Panchamatia and supervised by Dr Pratima Goyal and Prof Dr Vishaka Karnad.

ONE YEAR ADD-ON COURSE IN WORKSTATION DESIGN AND APPLIED ERGONOMICS

The one year Add-on Course in Workstation Design and Applied Ergonomics for the academic year 2022-23 was successfully conducted by the Community Resource Management specialization. This one-year certificate course aimed to provide a comprehensive understanding of workplace ergonomics and its practical applications. The major achievements and highlights of the course:

Course Structure: The schedule of the course was in alignment with the regular time-table of the lectures of the graduation course so that students could attend all the lectures of both the courses.

Expert Coordination: Dr Roopa Rao coordinated the course and organized field visits and industrial visits to facilitate practical learning. Inviting industry experts for guest lectures and facilitating internships and industrial visits to expose students to real-world applications of ergonomics have been key to the success of the students of the add-on course.

Career Opportunities: Graduates of the course can grab to various job opportunities in domain of occupation health and safety, such as Ergonomics Consultants, Ergonomics Specialists, Occupational Health and Safety Officers, Researchers, or Educators.

Research Projects: Students conducted research projects in different areas related to ergonomics, including studies on occupational health in the BPO sector, musculoskeletal disorders among bartenders, psychosocial and musculoskeletal risks faced by food delivery personnel, occupational hazards in hotel housekeeping, and work-related challenges among fishermen.

Recognition: The students presented their research at multiple inter-collegiate and university-level competitions and an international conference as well. They received several "Best Research Prize" awards at various state level and national level research competitions.

Industrial Visit: An industrial visit to Jaipur provided students with practical insights into the application of ergonomics in various industries. The visit included trips to Jaipur Rugs, HNS Coach Factory, Podar Shoe Factory, Kagzi Handmade Papers, and Omega Electronics and Scientific Instrumentation, along with visits to local attractions.

Awards and Certificates: The valedictory ceremony recognizes the Best Project, Highest Marks achievers, and students with 100% attendance. The Best Project Award went to the research project on occupational health in the BPO sector.

The Value-Added Course in Workstation Design and Applied Ergonomics has empowered students with knowledge and practical skills, and despite challenges, the college has plans to enhance the course further to provide an enriching educational experience. CERTIFICATE COURSE IN HOME SCIENCE

A new beginning....

The College of Home Science Nirmala Niketan started a certificate course in Home Science in 2022 – 2023 as a Self-Financed programme. This report encapsulates the journey, achievements, challenges, and the experience of the programme, which was launched for a unique cohort of students in the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic.

It being a new programme, only a few students applied for it. With a to and fro, and parents' insistence, the certificate programme did start up with five very young students who had completed their 10th standard. Kudos to the Management and in particular to Ms Noella for having the courage and determination of shouldering the programme throughout its entirety successfully.

Even with the small size of the class the aim of the course was to fulfil a void in the lives of those who had registered. A parents' and students' orientation programme was organised, where parents expressed their great appreciation to the management for having taken up the challenge to begin the course.

The course covered different subjects like Personality Development, Home-making, Home gardening, Cookery- Food and Nutrition, Sewing-Textiles and clothing, Art and Craft, Home Decoration, Home Maintenance and Entrepreneurship - Setting up a small home scale business. The Course was a combination of theory and practical work making it meaningful and beneficial for the overall development of the students.

Other than the academic activities the students even took part in the cultural programme of Independence Day celebration. The students put up a dance performance with costumes representing different states. This event gave the students a platform to come up on the stage to perform which gave a huge boost to their morale and confidence.

They were also taken on a one day industrial visit where they visited the Ikea Mall. Here they were exposed to all the different fields of Home Decoration, Home Maintenance, Textile and Cookery. Later they were also taken on a field trip to Alibaug where they could enjoy the beautiful natural surroundings of the region. All in all it was a great experience for them as they learnt how to work with each other and maintain good inter-personal behaviour.

The experience was not only overwhelming for the students but also for the parents and teachers. So here we share some of the experiences of the parents and teachers:

1. "I have always believed that teaching is an act of service. A selfless serviceable profession, and an equally crucial responsibility. Teachers lay the foundations of the human progress, they alone can make or break entire generations of future leaders and decision makers. Having said that, I have always understood and appreciated this responsibility that I willingly shouldered. After years of being stuck in the 9 to 5 corporate loop, teaching has been my second innings at doing something I truly love. Being a teacher at Nirmala Niketan, especially for their Home Science Certificate Course, has been a rewarding experience for me. It has allowed me to do things that actually matter. I taught Home Decoration and Personality Development, two subjects. I believe to be crucial for day-to-day

practical learning. Home Decoration helped students apply what they learnt in their homes, to make these spaces more aesthetically pleasing and functional by smartly utilising already existing objects. It taught them how to organise their spaces and manage their homes in perfect order. Personality Development was a path-breaking subject that made students gain a higher self-esteem, taught them the ideals of clear communication and imbibed in them integrative behavioural characteristics of discipline, mutual respect, punctuality, confidence and problem-solving, among others. It moulded aspects of their ever-changing personalities to not only push them to be better citizens of society, but also give them a sense of accountability.

Beyond teaching these subjects, I have also managed to find a purpose by facilitating academic growth and extra-curricular development among my students. Being able to create a positive impact on their ever curious minds has given me a sense of achievement as an educator. And so, in many ways, this difficult responsibility has also become a source of fulfillment and assurance in my abilities as an academician.

Besides being a teacher, I am also a parent to one of the students. This aided me in dualistically appreciating Nirmala Niketan as an institution and the efforts its staff puts for each and every student. Like angels sent on to the Earth from heavens, the teachers, nuns and non-teaching staff have committed themselves to the betterment of their students. Even though the Home Science Certificate Course had a small pool of students, the staff went above and beyond to provide an excellent learning atmosphere".

2. "The 'Certificate Course in Home Science' has been designed under the UGC recommendations for skill based courses. It was the first year of teaching since the new course was designed. My subject was 'Sewing - Textiles and clothing'. The students were unusual; five young, innocent girls just out of school eager to step into college to learn new things.

I started with fundamentals of clothing like basic hand stitches, seams, facings etc. Teaching to work on sewing machine was a big task. Slowly, with intensive practice, the girls started to sew on the machine with ease. It was time to teach them various steps of clothing construction. Drafting followed by cutting the fabric, stitching the cut fabric into final garment and finally the finishing touches like putting hooks, making patch work resulted in a beautiful garment. They stitched two such garments each.

Embroidery is part of good dress-making. Taught them basic embroidery stitches. They created beautiful handkerchiefs with these stitches.

A workshop was held to teach Tie-n-dye and block printing. Various techniques were taught and they came up with beautiful tied-n-dyed articles.

Basic Macramé' knots were taught to them. Once they were familiar with the knots they created beautiful articles like a wall-hanging, bracelet, key-chains etc.

Two Semester examinations were held in the months of September and April. All the girls passed. It was an enriching experience for me as a teacher. The joy on the children's faces and the confidence in their overall conduct after acquiring so many skills was evident towards the end!! The management extended immense support and the parents' co-operation was outstanding in most cases. I thank them both".

Ms Seema Raut (Teacher) 3. "Beautiful experience of our "Special Panch Pandav" from the Certificate Course in Home Science. It was a very good opportunity I received to facilitate the teaching of one topic for our special Panch Panday. In the course of teaching them I could not only practice my learnings on Inclusive Education but also learn from them. They were a group of five motivated students and with the full support of their parents, the college inaugurated the Certificate Course in Home Science for them. As the course began, the group formed a bond. Their friendship was seen in how they related to one another. There would be constant quarrelling over small things but after that the desire to resolve matters was alive. They would talk to the teachers to resolve their problems but would solve them on their own. It was an amazing experience to see them grow bit by bit. From learning to travel on their own, to complete so many hand skill activities which they were doing for the first time and finding it difficult. They were able to cook and bake, stitch and paint, learn about basic home maintenance, even gardening and many more skills. There was a joy on their face to be with people who could understand them and help them grow. It gave each of us teachers, a push to put in our best for them. A big salute to the parents who took equal efforts to support their child; a salute also to all the teachers for their patience and love in continuing to teach them. Hats off to Ms Noella Dias, Manager, for her constant encouragement and dedication to make the course possible by coordinating the course the whole year through. Thanks also to Dr Avari, Director - Self Finance, for her direction and Dr Bakshi, In-charge Principal for her encouraging support".

INDUSTRIAL VISIT TO PUNE



An industrial visit was organised to several different industries from 13th March to 15th March 2023, where the students from M.Sc. I Foods, Nutrition and Dietetics and M.Sc. I and M.Sc. II Food Processing and Preservation got great practical exposure of how things work in different organisations and industries. Ms Jacqueline Colaco and Dr Minelly Rodrigues accompanied the students. The tour started on day 1 to ICAR-National Research Centre for Grapes at Manjri Farm, Pune where technical officer, Mr B.B Khade introduced the students to how things work in the organisation. He showed the vineyards where several different varieties of grapes are grown. The organisation also made wine, but not for commercial purposes. The four different types of grapes were shown to the students Thereafter, the students were taken to show their fermentation unit. After our visit to ICAR, we made our way to Agrozee fresh foods pvt ltd, founded by Mr Mahesh Londhe. We arrived at their location in Uruli. We began our visit by watching a video about the startup, which highlighted their mission to incorporate more millets into our diets. Mr Mahesh then showcased a variety of products made primarily from millets, such as ragi ladoo, energy bars, different flours, and cookies. We even had the opportunity to taste

samples of their ragi ladoo. On Day 2, we visited Chitale Bandhu Industry. We were welcomed by our college alumna Ms Madhura Patankar, who works in the quality assurance department of Chitale Bandhu. A documentary consisting of the history, owners, production unit and products of Chitale Bandhu was shown. Then an overview of bakarwadi production from the viewing gallery was given. After this, we visited a Katraj Dairy based in Pune that manufactures milk and milk products, icecreams, tak (buttermilk), flavored milk, ghee and more. We were first shown a documentary followed by a visit to the shed which generates steam for milk processing. We were then given a tour of the entire facility, which included pasteurization, homogenization and packaging units with the barcoding machines as well as equipment to make ghee. On day 3, we visited, Venky's Foods (Poultry Processing plant), Lonavla. The unit manager, took us step-by-step through the entire processing, from slaughter of the chickens to the completed product. After Venkys visit, we went to "Rupam Food Manufacturers Pvt Ltd" in Lonavala. It was also our last stop of the day as well as our IV. They manufacture and sell a variety of brittles. The company's business head Mrs Aditi Gupta, led us through the brittle-making procedure. There, we had the chance to watch the coconut chikkis being processed in person. These entire three days were full of fun, enjoyment. We all had an amazing experience. We were exposed to new learnings, be it related to unity with each and every person we met and also to new environment, experiments and new ideas. This was a wonderful time all together, which we all will cherish as sweet memories. We are all very grateful to our college for organising such a wonderful industrial visit.

A TOUR TO REMEMBER (2023)





An educational tour of the Department of Human Development for the academic year 2022-23 was conducted between the 13th to 18th of March 2023, with visits to the cities of Bhavnagar and Vadodara in Gujarat. The tour was organised by our teachers Prof Dr Kamini Rege and Ms Payal Maheshwari. The tour began from Bandra on 13th March, reaching Bhavnagar early morning the next day. We started off the day with a visit to the PNR Society for Relief and Rehabilitation of the Disabled, an umbrella institute including schools, intervention centres, research centres, etc. working for children with disabilities (cerebral palsy, mental retardation, multiple disabilities, autism spectrum disorder, and vision impairment, hearing impairment etc.).

We headed towards the Dakshinamoorthy Bal Mandir - the famous school founded by the pioneer of early childhood education in India; Gijubhai Badheka. It is a phenomenal school, following the principles of early childhood care and education given by Gijubhai himself, Montessori, etc. The quality of care provided to the children alongside the age and developmentally appropriate education was something we had only seen in theory so far; hence witnessing this in person made it all the more illuminating for us about childhood education in India.

We were in awe and amazement and its charisma was not getting over, yet we had to leave for Vadodara and so we did. We reached the city by evening; checked in and enjoyed a lovely dinner. The following day, we visited the Lakshmi Vilas (Palace built by the Maharaja Sayajirao Gaekwad III in 1980). Though not a part of the "educational"

aspect of the tour, it still gave us a broad context about Maharaja Sayajirao and his jurisdiction in olden Baroda and the impact it has had on education and lifestyle in current Vadodara. After an eye-opening tour by the guide in the palace, we left for our next stop on the map: Lakshya Trust.

Lakshya Trust is a non-profit organisation working for the welfare of (and awareness surrounding) Transgender community, specifically and LGBTQIA+ community in general. We learned that they work in tandem with multiple other agencies as well as the government to provide medical and otherwise intervention for the community. They graciously opened our eyes to their truths and realities and helped bust myths for us so that we could, stepping forward, be more empathetic towards them and help others as well. In the evening, we went to Navabazaar, Mangal market and Baroda Prints for some shopping and even visited the Sayajibaug garden for some sightseeing. On 17th March, we visited to the Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda; the highlight of which for us, was the Chetan Balwadi preschool. Similar to Dakshinamurthy Bal Mandir, they too follow the principles of Montessori and Gijubhai to provide optimal care and education to the children. We explored the Balwadi, observed their classrooms, materials, environment, etc. We also had a look at the HDFS Department of MSUB, where we finally got to meet the teachers of our teachers! After lunch at the hotel, we visited the Bal Bhavan Society working for the holistic betterment of children, including children with disabilities. From fine arts to music to dance to sports to disability intervention, you name it they provided it - and the best of it too. Once again, after this visit we went for shopping and dinner. This concluded our educational tour, and we left for Mumbai that same night, reaching home in the morning of 18th March 2023.

INTERNAL QUALITY ASSURANCE CELL (IQAC)



SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE

The Scholarship orientation was given to all the levels of the students regarding the various scholarships available at college level, government level and those available to students through various religious trusts as well as through various company scholarships. Regular announcements and messages were sent to remind students to apply for scholarship and keep them abreast of the dates for application. Below are the details of the various types of scholarships availed by the students:

College level need-based scholarship

Applications were invited for college level scholarships, and these applicants were then interviewed to know out more about their need. A total of 14 students received the scholarships and an amount of Rs. 77,000/- was availed by the students. The students were paid from the interest earned from fixed deposits for scholarships that were instituted by individuals and trusts through the years and also an additional amount collected through a special donation drive initiated by the Scholarship Committee for the year 2020-21 due to the pandemic.

Government scholarships:

A total number of 28 students applied for Government scholarship at the national and state level

- National level scholarship:
 - Three student applied and received scholarship under category of religious minority
- State level scholarships: A total of twenty five have applied for the scholarships.
 - Six students applied for the Government of India Post Matric Scholarship under the Social Justice and Special Assistance Department
 - One student applied for the Post Matric Scholarship Scheme under Tribal Development Department
 - Seven student applied for scholarship through OBC, SEBC, VJNT and SBC Welfare Department
 - Eleven students from open category applied for the Rajashri Chhatrapati Shahu Maharaj Shikshan Shulk Shishyavutti under the Directorate of Higher Education.

EMPLOYMENT PLACEMENT CELL

The Employment Placement Cell (EPC) at the College of Home Science, Nirmala Niketan, focused on comprehensive career development in the academic year 2022-2023. The aim was to equip students with skills and knowledge beyond job placements.

Staff members in the committee comprised Dr Roopa Rao (Convenor), Dr Neha Mulchandani, Ms Rhonda Divecha, Dr Tasneem Rawat and Ms Kashmira Dastoor. Major highlights included:

1. Skill Development Workshops:

- Resume Writing Workshop: Conducted on February 9th, 2023, this workshop aimed to improve students' resume-writing skills. It benefited a hundred and seventy-six students from various undergraduate and postgraduate programs in Foods, Nutrition and Dietetics, Textile and Fashion Technology, Human Development, Community Resource Management, and more.
- Interview Facing Skills Workshop: Held on February 28th, 2023, this workshop, conducted by Mr Hugo D'Souza, focused on interview preparation. It was attended by 102 students from different programs, including T.Y. B.Sc., M.Sc. II, and P.G. Diploma classes.
- Classroom to Cubicle Workshop: This workshop, led by senior learning and development trainer Mr Dilip Pinto, covered various aspects of transitioning from academics to the corporate world. It benefited 179 students from T.Y. B.Sc., M.Sc. II, and P.G. Diploma classes.

2. Campus Recruitment Drive:

• The 'Campus Recruitment Drive 2023 spanned three days and involved more than 95 students participating. Over 50 students received job offers from 13 companies, including positions in Human Resource (HR), content research, nutritionist roles, academic coordination, sales, and more.

• The drive involved companies from diverse sectors, indicating a wide range of job opportunities for students.

Studying Abroad Opportunities:

The session cum workshop on June 25th, 2022, featured Ms Ella Davis, Student Recruitment Manager at the University of Arts London. She introduced students to various postgraduate study programmes in London. This session primarily targeted postgraduate programmes in fields like fine arts, interior and fashion designing, photography, media screening, graphics, fashion business, and fashion branding.

Ms Ella Davis highlighted the six colleges under the University of Arts London and the various programs they offer. This session provided valuable information to students considering studying abroad.

Industry-Academia Collaboration:

While the committee vision is industry-academia collaboration as a future plan, it can be assumed that the workshops and campus recruitment drive already involved collaboration with industry experts and professionals who shared their insights and conducted sessions.

The OCER/OCLD (Oberoi Central Employment Register and Oberoi Centre of Learning and Development) recruitment process demonstrated collaboration with the hotel industry, allowing 19 students to apply for various positions in The Oberoi Group.

Future plans include further strengthening these collaborations, inviting more industry experts for guest lectures, internships, and industry projects, offering practical exposure to students, and aligning curriculum and skill development initiatives with industry requirements. These detailed insights provide a better understanding of how the EPC's initiatives directly benefited students and how they aim to continue enhancing students' employability through various programmes and collaborations in the future.





India: The Global Source of Power

What is luck? Out of 195 countries in the world, being privileged to be an Indian is luck.

I am a proud Indian.

Yes! My nation, my India – the global source of power.

Independence ushered in the dreams of not just an individual, but also economic, social and political freedom for all the citizens of India. India's independence was in itself a turning point in its political, social and economic history. The country was hopelessly poor as a result of steady deindustrialization by Britain. India took baby steps to become one of the largest democracies in the world, overcoming a plethora of challenges to earn global recognition. India has come a long way since its independence, leaving behind a series of landmarks that define its journey from the agony of the partition to a strong, powerful and developing nation. It has built a modern economy, remained a democracy, lifted millions out of poverty, has become a space and nuclear power and developed a robust foreign policy.

Keeping in mind, 50 years ago we had zero industry, 12% literacy rate and almost negligible exports (of the finished goods variety), and always on the verge of a famine without even having self- sufficiency in food. We ran a controlled almost socialistic economy where phones were instruments only for the rich and even then it took (as recently as 1990) over a year or so to get an instrument.

Let's discuss about the change in India

Right to vote: With the enforcement date of the Constitution of India i.e. from 26th January 1950, the Constitution of India gave every Indian adult the right to vote and other fundamental rights and duties.

Nationalisation of Railway Network: Railways network was nationalised in 1951 and was initially divided into three zones. Indian Railways is now one of the world's largest railway networks comprising 119,630 km of tracks and 7,216 stations.

First Asian Games: India hosted the first-ever Asian Games in the year 1951 in New Delhi.

Growth of the Agriculture Sector: Since the late 1950s, the progress in agriculture has been somewhat steady. The sector grew at about 1% per annum in the first half of the 20th century. During the post-Independence era, the growth rate nudged about 2.6 percent per annum. Expansion of farming areas and the introduction of high-yielding varieties of crops were the major factors of growth in agricultural production.

First general elections: India took a democratic leap by conducting its first general elections in 1951, with Congress registering a thumping victory by winning 364 of the 489 seats. Jawaharlal Nehru became India's first prime minister.

Progress in Education Sector: Pulling itself out from the shackles of widespread illiteracy, India has managed to bring its education system at par with the global standard. The number of schools witnessed a dramatic increase during the post-independence era. The Parliament made elementary education a fundamental right for children in the age group of 6-14 years by passing the 86th amendment to the Constitution in 2002. At independence, India's literacy rate was a paltry 12.2 % which increased to 74.04% as per the 2011 census.

Achievements in the Field of Healthcare: A decrease in death rates is considered one of the major achievements that came India's way in this domain. India is now among the biggest economies of the world. In its 72 years of independence, India has several achievements to its credit. There's still a long way to go for India, though.

NETTLE FIBRE - CHANGING THE PERSPECTIVE OF FASHION?

Today in 21st century, high end fashion brands are deeply concerned about biodegradable and sustainable properties of their products. Is nettle fibre one of the solutions?





Nettle fabric also known as Nordic Silk, is used by popular fashion brands to make their amazing and mesmerising products and outfits. Such as, Emma Roberts wore vintage

prive at Oscars in LA, Billy Porter at 73rd Tony Awards and the teenage singer Belly Eilish in upcycle Burberry outfit. The best part about these outfits was, they had biodegradable and sustainable properties. The outfits were made from nettle, horseradish and Alpaca fleece.

Nettle fibre is extracted from stinging plant, abundantly found in Garhwal region of Uttarakhand and in the Himalayas. It is most breathable natural fibre. Its core fibre structure is different from other natural fibres. Nettle is soft, wrinkle resistant, and it shines dimly. The highest tensile strength of nettle is 59 mpa with weight fraction of 30%. Nettle plants can be also used for rennet to make cheese, as fodder for livestock, to make tea and beer.

Nettle fibre is biodegradable and 100% sustainable. The bark of nettle plants is collected and kept for drying for 2 to 3 days, it is then left in river for 7 to 10 days, this process is a retting process. Followed by boiling of barks, cleaning with water and separation of fibres. At the end carding is completed and spun yarn is produced then hand spun yarn goes onto handloom for weaving. Nettle yarn can be colourful. The beautiful shawl is made of Nettle fibre.

THE LUGRA - AN EAST INDIAN SAREE DRAPE



The Lugra; a ten yard saree, has been worn by women of the East Indian community for decades. East-Indians are natives of Mumbai who belong to the Roman Catholic faith. This community's culture, traditional rituals and clothings were largely influenced by the Maharashtrians, the British and the Portuguese.

The fabric and design is quite similar to the nauvari saree. Though the number of people wearing it on a daily basis have decreased, it is still worn by older women daily and by all age groups for festivities, weddings and more.

The number of vendors selling these pieces which sometimes have detailed embroidery work on them have largely reduced but its fame and need in the community haven't. A few noteworthy points about this saree are: married and unmarried women wear the coloured Lugra such as pink whereas widowed women opt for a blue, purple or grey Lugra.

In the past few decades other colour varieties have emerged. Each Lugra has a characteristic red and gold border as shown in the picture. The borders were also known as sarpanch kos (snake shedded skin) kombrichay pai (hen feet). Daily wear Lugras have less gold work woven in it. Such a draping technique is something done with extreme patience and skill, a skill that takes years of practice to perfect. The Lugra is worn with 13 pleats in the front, and 5 pleats are dropped for a kaashtha, and the padhar (pallu) is tucked into the right, taken over the left shoulder. The same material of 6.5 yards is worn as a regular saree as well. In an attempt to modernise the Lugra, it is now used to stitch dresses, T shirts, kurtas and other outfits that could be worn for any occasion.


A Lugra is such a piece of fabric that is never thrown out. Once a Lugra is worn out, it is cut into pieces for new born babies to be swaddled in. The rest of the cloth along with other leftover cotton/silk pieces is sewn into a goddari (quilt). Such a quilt is cherished in all households, one that lasts more than a lifetime.







I would like to start my speech by stating a quote by Carl Sagan, an American cosmologist, "The notion that science and spirituality are somehow mutually exclusive does a disservice to both". We might have heard multiple times that science and spirituality are on the opposite poles of a magnet. But is it really the truth?

So now first understand what science and spirituality individually is. Former one deals with the physics and later one deals with the spirit. Albert Einstein once said, "I assert that the cosmic religious experience is the strongest and the noblest driving force behind scientific research." In real life, science and spirituality make a great partnership. So, this is where he tried to say that the world has been facing problems due to imbalance of science and spirituality.

Science without spirituality has ill-served the Earth, and spirituality without science has degenerated into dogmatic exclusivity. We need both of them. I would like to end my speech here by giving all of us to ponder upon something and introspect ourselves. When a rich mixture of science and spirituality is available to us, why should we think in terms of 'either/or'? Why not include 'both/and'? Why not celebrate the unity of physics and metaphysics? Information and transformation? Because the holy synthesis of the two brings peace, success and holistic approach.






